BIBERAJ, ELEZ

Dr. Elez Biberaj is the Eurasia Division Director, responsible for VOA's multimedia programming targeting Russia, Ukraine, Armenia, Georgia and the Balkans. From June 2020 to December 2020, Dr. Biberaj served as Acting VOA Director. In response to audience consumption habits and content distribution challenges posed by Russian authorities, Dr. Biberaj accelerated the Eurasia Division's shift toward engaging digital audiences, harnessing the power of mobile and social platforms. He also worked closely with his counterparts at Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty to create the Current Time network, the first joint VOA/RFE/RL programming brand in the history of U.S. international broadcasting, launched to provide fact-based alternatives to Russian-language disinformation. Dr. Biberaj began his career in VOA in December 1980 as an international radio broadcaster in the Albanian Service and later worked in the Press Division of the former U.S. Information Agency as a senior writer/editor specializing in Soviet and East European affairs. Dr. Biberaj returned to VOA as Albanian Service chief in 1986, and for the next 18 years, helped the service develop into one of VOA's most successful broadcasting units. For more than a decade, he served in dual capacity as chief of the Albanian Service and director of VOA's European Division writers and researchers. Dr. Biberaj was named the Eurasia Division's managing editor in 2004, served as acting division

director the following year, and was appointed division director in 2006. He has a Ph.D. in Political Science from Columbia University and is the author of four books.

Writer, filmmaker and adventurer, Jon is a six-time grantee of the National Geographic Expeditions Council. One of the Society's 'Ocean Heroes,' his first assignment for National Geographic Magazine was documenting a 3,741 mile crossing of Antarctica by dogsled. Jon has written eleven books and produced/directed more than thirty documentary films. His National Geographic-sponsored Oceans 8 project took him and his teams around the world by sea kayak over the course of ten years (1999-2008), bringing back stories from the Aleutian Islands to French Polynesia, Gabon to Tasmania, and more, reporting on how the planet's one ocean and its various coastlines are faring in today's busy world. Jon lives in New York's Hudson Valley. He is the President of the One Ocean Media Foundation, Chairman of the Advisory Board of Adventure Science and Creative Affiliate of The Safina Center. For the past several years, Jon and his One Ocean Media Foundation / Oceans 8 Films team have focused on a series of short films about the environmental risks to, and hopes for the Hudson River Valley, the birthplace of the American environmental movement. Jon is a Visiting Lecturer at Bard College, in the Environment and Urban Studies Department; tune into his weekly radio show/podcast, 'The Green Radio Hour with Jon Bowermaster.'

Scott Brinton joined the faculty of Hofstra University's Lawrence Herbert School of Communication as a tenure-track assistant professor of journalism this September. Before that, he had been an adjunct and special assistant professor from January 2009 through May this year. He is also executive editor of Hofstra's online reporting platform, The Long Island Advocate, and co-director of the LHSC's Summer High School Journalism Institute. Outside of Hofstra, Brinton was executive editor of Herald Community Newspapers from 2016-21, and before that, a senior editor and reporter. In his nearly three decades with the news group, Brinton published more than 4,000 articles and completed 25 major investigations. Brinton's work has also appeared in or on The New York Times, Newsday, CBS News, MSNBC, the Oprah Winfrey Network, Long Beach Magazine, The Riverdale Press, and Jewish Star. Over the years, Brinton has earned nearly 140 national, state and regional reporting accolades, including New York Press Association Writer of the Year and Sports Writer of the Year honors, as well as Press Club of Long Island Outstanding Journalist. Additionally, he served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Bulgaria from 1991-93, teaching at a high school and university, building an English language library, and researching and writing a cultural guide for the corps. He holds degrees from Columbia University and SUNY Geneseo and graduate certificates from New York and Cornell universities.

While there she wrote some of the most popular stories on the site, including one about the keto diet that she still gets hate mail about. She also got to write about seemingly simple questions such as "What is a calorie?" and "Is corn a vegetable?" that turn out to be not simple at all. She has a master's degree in data visualization from the University of Girona, a master's degree in science, health, and environmental reporting from New York University, and a bachelor's degree in neurobiology and philosophy from the University of Pennsylvania.

A Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist who writes frequently about environmental science, Dan Fagin is also a science journalism professor at New York University. His bestselling book, Toms River: A Story of Science and Salvation, was awarded the 2014 Pulitzer for General Nonfiction, as well as the New York Public Library's Helen Bernstein Book Award for Excellence in Journalism, the National Academies Science Book Award and the Society of Environmental Journalists' Rachel Carson Environment Book Award, among other honors. Dan's recent publications include The New York Times, Scientific American, The Washington Post, Nature and Slate. His new book project is about monarch butterflies and the future of biodiversity in the Anthropocene. Before joining the NYU faculty in 2005, Dan was the environmental writer at Newsday for 15 years, during which time he was twice a principal member of reporting teams that were Pulitzer finalists. He has also won both of the best-known science journalism prizes in the United States: the Science Journalism Award of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the Science in Society Award of the National Association of Science Writers. At NYU, Dan is a Professor of Journalism (full) at the Arthur L. Carter Journalism Institute and the director of the masters-level Science, Health and Environmental Reporting Program (SHERP), one of the oldest and best-regarded science journalism training programs in the world, with more than 400 graduates since its founding in 1982. He is also the founder and director of the Science Communication Workshops at NYU, four-week short courses in which more than 800 science Ph.D. students, post-docs, medical students and professors at NYU have learned the basics of communicating scientific research effectively to the lay public.

Diana Jean Schemo is the co-founder of 100Reporters and founder and co-director of Double Exposure, the United States' only film festival and combined symposium dedicated to investigative cinema. She is an author and award-winning veteran national and foreign correspondent, with more than 25 years at *The New York Times* and the *Baltimore Sun*. She has covered poverty and child abuse, religion and culture. *The Times* nominated her

coverage of education for a Pulitzer Prize in 2003. As bureau chief for *The Times* in Rio de Janeiro from 1995 to 1999, Schemo tracked the drug war in Colombia, and that country's brutal conflict between leftist rebels and rightwing paramilitaries. Her stories chronicled the rise of Hugo Chávez in Venezuela, counterfeiting and baby trafficking in Paraguay, indentured servitude in Brazil, and journeys to the heartland of Brazil, where she wrote of previously uncontacted native tribes. She covered the trial of Klaus Barbie, the infamous "Butcher of Lyon," nuclear arms negotiations, the Kurdish exodus from Iraq following the first Gulf War, and the collapse of Communism in Eastern Europe. She has reported from more than 25 countries and regions, from Somalia to Israel, Iraq to the Amazon. She is a three time winner of The Times Publisher's Awards, and other prizes. Schemo's work has appeared in *Ms.*, *Marie Claire*, *New York* and *The New York Times* magazines. She is the author of the 2010 book *Skies to Conquer: A Year Inside the Air Force Academy* (Wiley). The book tracks a year in the life of one squadron at a time of upheaval in the military's youngest, if most controversial, service academy.

Ian Urbina is the director of The Outlaw Ocean Project, a non-profit journalism organization based in Washington D.C. that produces investigative stories about human rights, environment and labor concerns on the two thirds of the planet covered by water. Before founding The Outlaw Ocean Project, Urbina spent roughly 17 years as a staff reporter for The New York Times. Before leaving the Times staff in 2019, he had been an investigative reporter based in Washington. His series The Outlaw Ocean chronicled a diversity of crimes offshore, including the killing of stowaways, sea slavery, intentional dumping, illegal fishing, the stealing of ships, gun running, stranding of crews, and murder with impunity. He reported from Africa, Asia, Europe, South America and the Middle East, much of that time spent on fishing ships. Mr. Urbina has also written extensively on criminal justice issues, including stories about the use of prisoners for pharmaceutical experiments, immigrant detainees working unpaid, solitary confinement in immigration detention facilities, and the dependence of the U.S. Defense Department on prison labor. Several of his stories have been made into feature films. In 2008, Mr. Urbina was a member of the team of reporters that broke the story about then-Gov. Eliot Spitzer of New York and his use of prostitutes, a series of stories for which The New York Times won a Pulitzer in 2009. In 2016, he won a Polk Award for the Outlaw Ocean series and several other awards for a series called Drilling Down, about fracking. Before joining The Times in 2003, Mr. Urbina was in a doctoral program in history and anthropology at the University of Chicago, where he specialized on Cuba.
